REGULAR SESSION  
JULY 16, 2019**

The Historic Preservation Commission of the City of Joplin met on Tuesday, July 16, 2019, at 5:00 P.M. in the Fifth Floor Conference Room at the Joplin City Hall at 602 South Main Street, Joplin, Missouri.

Keegan Stanton introduced himself as the new planner for the department of Planning, Development, and Neighborhood Services. Everyone welcomed him.

**Items 1. & 2. Meeting Called to order and Roll Call.**

Mr. Ramsour opened the meeting and Ms. Dunn called the roll.

**Item 3. – Approval of the Minutes:**

Mr. Ramsour stated that there are 3 months of minutes that have been tabled. Mr. Ramsour stated that we should take them separate.

Ms. Morton stated that she would like to table the minutes for corrections. Mr. Walters stated that the minutes should be corrected in the meeting. Ms. Morton stated that since we have a full agenda that we should table the minutes and they be sent out for corrections. Ms. Morton restated her motion to table for editing purposes. Ms. Sullivan asked Mr. Walters if these were all edited by the end of the week would that be acceptable. Mr. Walters stated that we would have to meet to approve them. Mr. Walters mentioned that this board could get into trouble for having so many minutes tabled and not approved or approved with corrections. In the past, editing has been done that was not in the public meeting, especially now since we had a meeting and case that went to Council. Ms. Sullivan asked if the minutes could be sent to the Chairman and then the Chairman would send them back with corrections if needed. She wanted to know if that could happen. Mr. Walters stated that we could make that happen. So, the determination would be that Ms. Dunn will make corrections to the minutes and forward them to Ms. Sullivan and Mr. Walters for corrections.

**Item 4. - Budget**

Mr. Walters stated because of the Missouri Preservation Conference some of the line items are in the negative. This was discussed with the Director and he will move funds around to cover the negative funds. The membership for the National Trust expired in 2014, we are official members

Forest Park Cemetery contains a number of monuments (granite, marble, slate) as well as features representing many significant periods and cultural and religious backgrounds. In particular some monuments in Forest Park Cemetery feature die in socket, die on base, lawn markers, plaques, urns, architectural forms, statuaries, ledger/slab stones, box tombs, and mausoleums, including one for public use.

**Finding:** The site meets the requirements for criteria 6 require an architectural significance and level of craftsmanship for periods throughout the time of service.

*Its suitability for preservation or restoration.*

The cemetery is maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department of the City of Joplin. Landmark designation will add the Joplin Historic Preservation Commission review through Certificate of Appropriateness to formalize preservation efforts for existing Historic features.

**Finding:** The site meets the requirements for criteria 10 for the abundance presence of features to be preserved.

Staff recommends Osborne Cemetery to be designated as a local landmark.

Ms. Morton stated that the Parks and Recreation Board unanimously supports and approves Case HL 2019-011.

Ms. Morton wanted to give a report from Parks and Recreation Department that they are very excited about doing the parks. Mr. Hutchinson and Mr. Parker are no longer on the board. Mr. Detar volunteered to be on the board. I also invited all of them to our meetings.

Mr. Ramsour closed the public hearing.

#### **Item 6. – Discussions Items**

a. CLG Funding – Mr. Walters – Award East Town Survey Phase II

The Financial Assistance Agreement has been signed by the City Manager and sent back to SHPO. I have not received the executed agreement back yet and once I have that I will have the green light to go forward to East Town.

Ms. Sullivan wanted to know once we receive that back can we can put out the RFP? Mr. Walters stated that was correct.

Mr. Ramsour stated that to be specific the Federal reimbursement is \$17, 640.00 is that correct?

Mr. Walters stated that was correct, 60% of the total project. This is for the second phase of the East town project.

the applicant. He also provided ordinance passed by City Council, and recorded plats. He also found a master thesis which also references to Joplin Projects, however, there is some inconsistency between cemeteries it is referring to, specifically Fairview and Osborn.

**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE:**

*Its character, interest, or value as part of the development, heritage, or cultural characteristics of the community, county, state, or country;*

Fairview Cemetery, as cemeteries in many Cities, plays a significant role in the Pre-City Beautiful Era of urban development in Joplin. The Rural or Garden Cemetery was an early planned approach to urban development prior to the field we recognize today as urban planning. High density, unplanned tenement-based development of the pre-1890's left the urban landscape with little greenspace except for the existing churchyards with graves at capacity. The Rural Cemetery or Garden Cemetery movement began the introduction of greenspace into the City, where the first public cemeteries would be used not just for burial, but well landscaped areas for public outdoor use effectively making the cemeteries of the era the first City parks. The success of this first approach to public dedication of land for the public to have access to greenspace, allow fresh air into the urban center and escape the emissions from unregulated industry, lead to the first period of formally recognized urban planning, the City Beautiful Movement. The results of this movement were projects of renown such as Central Park in New York City or in the case of Joplin, Schifferdecker Park circa 1903-1910 by the firm Hare&Hare who later redesigned Osborne Cemetery (at the time called Joplin Cemetery once the original Joplin Cemetery was renamed Fairview in 1895). In this period (Circa 1920) Fairview was updated in the Architectural Park Subtype to incorporate automobile access and why it is a Transition Park Cemetery Landscape Architectural Style. (Note: Hare&Hare also wrote Joplin's early Zoning and Comprehensive Plan in 1949.) Cemeteries are physical records of a City's history for unlike other architectural works they reflect a period of construction but continue to capture the history of a City through the period of their service through those who are interred, and Fairview is Joplin's longest serving cemetery. Citations added to application upon staff review.

Finding: This site meets the requirements for criteria 1 for its association with the development and heritage of the community.

*Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the community, county, state, or country;*

Fairview was established by Joplin's first mayor and several persons of note and notoriety are interred. Please reference application attachment.

Finding: The building meets the requirements of criteria 3 for its association with many including Jessie F. Osborne, John Reding, The Young Brothers interred and Patrick Murphy, O. Pitcher and Edward Zelleken interred and later relocated.

*Its embodiment of elements of design, detailing, materials, or craftsmanship that render it architecturally significant;*

Fairview Cemetery contains a number of monuments (granite, marble, slate) as well as features representing many significant periods and cultural and religious backgrounds.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 6 require an architectural significance and level of craftsmanship for periods throughout the time of service.

*Its unique location or singular physical characteristics that make it an established or familiar visual feature;*

Fairview Cemetery was Joplin's first public cemetery and been a landmark throughout the city history.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 8 for its familiarity and association with the history of the City of Joplin.

*Its suitability for preservation or restoration.*

The cemetery is maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department of the City of Joplin. Landmark designation will add the Joplin Historic Preservation Commission review through Certificate of Appropriateness to formalize preservation efforts for existing Historic features.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 10 for the abundance presence of features to be preserved.

Staff recommends Fairview Cemetery, located at 1201 S. Maiden Lane, be designated as a local landmark.

Ms. Morton stated that the Parks and Recreation Board unanimously supports and approves Case HL 2019-008.

ii. Forest Park Cemetery

Case HL 2019-09: 102 N. Range Line, Joplin, MO. Forest Park Cemetery was established in 1873 as an Architectural Park Landscape. The site appears to have undergone some significant changes. The original drive entry in the south east corner of the typical rectilinear site has been developed and the stone wall gate entrance no longer exists. The goosefoot intersection channeled traffic layout still exists for the original entrance.

**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE:**

*Its character, interest, or value as part of the development, heritage, or cultural characteristics of the community, county, state, or country;*

Forest Park Cemetery demonstrates the continued evolution of Cemetery Landscape Architecture in Joplin. Following the original Fairview Cemetery Rural/Garden Style (later Transition Style following incorporation of Architectural Park features) and the formalization of the Modern Cemetery Style, Forest Park Cemetery is a strong example of a cemetery platted as an Architectural Park Cemetery and distinct from a Transition Park Cemetery Type for earlier incarnations of cemetery design are absent. This is most strongly noted in the original entrance layout where the drive enters at an angle or corner of the site. The most prominent feature is the architecturally elaborate stone gate entrance (no longer existing) and the goose foot channeled paths emanating away from the main entrance and circling back to the center creating periphery sections. Cemeteries are physical records of a City's history for unlike other architectural works they reflect a period of construction but continue to capture the history of a City through the period of their service through those who are interred.

Finding: This site meets the requirements for criteria 1 for its association with the development and heritage of the community.

*Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the community, county, state, or country;*

Most notably the land for Forest Park Cemetery was donated by Jeremiah Turk, the Turk Family being settlers of the area.

Finding: The building meets the requirements of criteria 3 for its association with Jeremiah Turk.

*Its embodiment of elements of design, detailing, materials, or craftsmanship that render it architecturally significant;*

Forest Park Cemetery contains a number of monuments (granite, marble, slate) as well as features representing many significant periods and cultural and religious backgrounds. In particular some monuments in Forest Park Cemetery feature die in socket, die on base, lawn markers, plaques, urns, architectural forms, statuary, ledger/slab stones, box tombs, and mausoleums, including one for public use.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 6 require an architectural significance and level of craftsmanship for periods throughout the time of service.

*Its unique location or singular physical characteristics that make it an established or familiar visual feature;*

Forest Park Cemetery is located along Joplin's largest commercial corridor and is associated with the current Forest Park Baptist Church.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 8 for its familiarity and association with the history of the City of Joplin.

*Its suitability for preservation or restoration.*

The cemetery is maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department of the City of Joplin. Landmark designation will add the Joplin Historic Preservation Commission review through Certificate of Appropriateness to formalize preservation efforts for existing Historic features.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 10 for the abundance presence of features to be preserved.

Staff recommends Forrest Park Cemetery, located at 102 N. Range Line, be designated as a local landmark.

Ms. Morton stated that the Parks and Recreation Board unanimously supports and approves Case HL 2019-009.

iii. Parkway Cemetery

Case HL 2019-10: East Side of 33<sup>rd</sup> & McClelland Blvd., Joplin, MO. Parkway Cemetery was established in 1933 and does not fit a type of Architectural Style. The construction is a single loop

Cemetery not consistent with Architectural Landscaping styles or types.

**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE:**

*Its character, interest, or value as part of the development, heritage, or cultural characteristics of the community, county, state, or country;*

Cemeteries are physical records of a City's history for unlike other architectural works they reflect a period of construction but continue to capture the history of a City through the period of their service through those who are interred.

Finding: This site meets the requirements for criteria 1 for its association with the development and heritage of the community.

*Its location as a site of a significant local, county, state, or national event;*

Parkway Cemetery was part of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration and the Works Progress Administration efforts to recover following the Great Depression.

Finding: This site meets the requirements for criteria 2 for its association FERA/WPA.

*Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the community, county, state, or country;*

Interred at Parkway Cemetery are Melissa and Charles Cuther, the Meeks family, Susie May Reaves, and Dr. Harold E. Brazil (Tuskegee Airman).

Finding: The building meets the requirements of criteria 3 for its association with the above interred.

*Its embodiment of elements of design, detailing, materials, or craftsmanship that render it architecturally significant;*

Parkway Cemetery contains a number of monuments (granite, marble, slate) as well as features representing many significant periods and cultural and religious backgrounds. In particular some monuments in Parkway Cemetery feature die in socket, die on base, lawn markers, plaques.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 6 require an architectural significance and level of craftsmanship for periods throughout the time of service.

*Its suitability for preservation or restoration.*

The cemetery is maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department of the City of Joplin. Landmark designation will add the Joplin Historic Preservation Commission review through Certificate of Appropriateness to formalize preservation efforts for existing Historic features.

Finding: The site meets the requirements for criteria 10 for the abundance presence of features to be preserved.

Staff recommends Parkway Cemetery to be designated as a local landmark.

Ms. Morton stated that the Parks and Recreation Board unanimously supports and approves Case HL 2019-010.

iv. Osborne Cemetery

Case HL 2019-11: West Side of 33<sup>rd</sup> & McClelland Blvd., Joplin MO. Osborne Cemetery was established in 1938 with the design as Architectural Park Cemetery Hare & Hare 1920.

The original design included a large area including Parkway Cemetery and much of the land that is currently part of the Freeman Hospital complex. Only the area of Osborne Cemetery reflects the original design and has since been altered. Stone Walled entrance and along McClelland still exist however the planned monument on the east side was never constructed, and important feature for an Architectural Park Cemetery.

**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE:**

*Its character, interest, or value as part of the development, heritage, or cultural characteristics of the community, county, state, or country;*

Cemeteries are physical records of a City's history for unlike other architectural works they reflect a period of construction but continue to capture the history of a City through the period of their service through those who are interred.

Finding: This site meets the requirements for criteria 1 for its association with the development and heritage of the community.

*Its location as a site of a significant local, county, state, or national event;*

Osborne Cemetery was part of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration and the Works Progress Administration efforts to recover following the Great Depression.

Finding: This site meets the requirements for criteria 2 for its association FERA/WPA.

*Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the community, county, state, or country;*

Most notably the cemetery is named after Jesse F. Osborne. A record setting five-time Joplin Mayor.

Finding: The building meets the requirements of criteria 3 for its association with Jessie F. Osborne.

*Its identification as the work of a master builder, designer, architect, or landscape architect whose individual work has influenced the development of the community, county, state, or country;*

In 1920 Osborne Cemetery was designed by landscape architects and early City Planners Hare&Hare. Hare&Hare worked on over 300 projects throughout the Midwest including much pre-J.C. Nichols Kansas City built environment. Projects in Joplin include the first Children's Home, Shifferdecker Park, T. M. Spotford residence, Mount Hope Cemetery, Cunningham Park, the 1914 Park & Boulevard system, Joplin City Cemetery (Fairview), Eastmorland Subdivision, Roanoke Terrace Addition, 1949 Joplin Planning and Zoning Code, 1954 Joplin Planning Report, Normandy Shopping Court and the Mission Hills Subdivision.

Finding: The building meets the requirements of criteria 5 for its association with Landscape Architects Hare&Hare.

again. Ms. Sullivan wanted to know that our membership is the National Trust and Historic Preservation? Mr. Walters stated that was correct. Mr. Ramsour asked if there were any other questions for Mr. Walters on budget? Mr. Bruckner stated that the budget states there is no change in it and what are the Legal and Professional fees? 6. Remember that this is a Public Hearing and all sides have a right to give testimony or state one side of any issue.

The Historic Preservation Commission of the City of Joplin through this introduction, accepts into evidence the 2012 Comprehensive Plan, the Zoning Code of the City of Joplin, Appendix B (Historic Preservation) of the Zoning Code of the City of Joplin, the 2015 Historic Preservation Plan and the Sunshine Lamp Historic District Design Review Guidelines.

- a. Local Historic Landmark Nominations
  - i. Fairview Cemetery

Case HL 2019-08: 1201 S. Maiden Lane, Joplin, MO. Mr. Walters thanked the applicant, clearly, they are professionals who provided an abundance to staff to make the review. Fairview Cemetery was established in 1873, with the transition Park Cemetery architectural style. Originally platted as Rural Cemetery Landscape Style mean to create a romantic vision of English landscaped garden. Further expansion of the cemetery incorporated alterations of Architectural Park Subtype features intended to create a modern visual focus on entrance and create looped design for automobile access. Upon review Mr. Walters substantially confirmed the documentation that was provided by



- b. Training for local realtors – 2020 Budget – Mr. Walters
- c. Historic architect consult – 2020 Budget – Mr. Walters

Mr. Walters stated he would do b & c at the same time. The only thing we have locked in for the 2020 Budget is Memorial Hall. Usually, with the remainder of our budget would still have grant reimbursement, but we don't have a grant to go after. The 2020 CLG is very tight and Memorial Hall is going to be the priority. We need to have some proposals and make sure everything is fine for reimbursement of possible grant. The only thing committed is the \$9,400.00 for Memorial Hall. The two things that have been discussed previously are the training for the local realtors or Historic Architects.

Ms. Sullivan stated she was a little confused because she thought the realtor training was coming out of what we have left in our 2019 budget.

Mr. Walters mentioned that was left in the 2019 budget because that was part of the application for Memorial Hall. The way Finance has planned is for that 60% of that revenue coming back in because of grant.

Mr. Ramsour wanted to know what staff wanted the commission to do?

Mr. Walters stated to take from our goals and make proposals for our 2020 budget is Memorial Hall.

Ms. Morton wanted to know if phase II will be a 2-year contract? They were explaining in St. Joseph, that by the time you work with the community that have fiscal years that they are.....Mr. Walters stated he would have to see the agreement. Ms. Morton wanted to know why we cannot use the remaining \$9,280.00 of our 2019 money for a direct contract after we get an RFP to do the Memorial Hall nomination.

Mr. Walters stated he had been asked the question before I have answered it and I will answer it again. Whenever we do the budget, we were applying for a grant that was anticipated that 60% revenue returned. That is how finance has planned it for this year. We could try and make an argument and throw something the second that we could have 40% of that \$9,400 but we have very little time to do that. Ms. Morton stated she took the time to speak to two Historic Preservation Specialist in St. Joseph and she was told that could be done. Mr. Walters stated that we need as close to \$10 thousand for the National Register Nomination for Memorial Hall and we do not have that much. Ms. Sullivan stated that she thinks Ms. Morton is asking if we do a direct contract put in there get part of the money now and the rest out of next year's budget. Ms. Morton stated that she is concerned that we won't hear again until July 2020 and we still have not.....Mr. Walters stated that the Commission needs to have a project for the 2020 budget, which is basically the budget is for East Town this year \$29,400.00 and whether or not we are getting grant reimbursement for our projects future projects.

Ms. Sullivan proposed that the top priority for this next fiscal year is to have Memorial Hall done.

d. Sunshine Lamp District Expansion Sub-Committee status – Mr. Stanton  
Mr. Stanton stated that he was told that the Sunshine Lamp District is being expanded. He has begun filling out the zoning application on behalf of the property owners. Once that is complete, we will send it with a letter form to the property owner for them to sign and return. If they do not respond back, we will follow up with another letter and make phone calls if necessary.

e. Historic Marker status

1. MoDot marker at 7<sup>th</sup> & Rangeline

Mr. Ramsour stated that Dr. Hudson and Dr. Marble were on the same page of the location of the marker. Mr. Walters has sent a google map to show where the location would be.

f. Joplin's 2023 Birthday Celebration: Report of 7-9-2019 meeting.

Mr. Walters stated he had notes from Council Informal session of July 15, 2019.... the meeting of the celebration committee was July 7, 2019. Our representative of this commission is Ms. Sullivan. Ms. Sullivan corrected that there are more commissioners on the committee but they are not representing the Commission but other organizations.

### **Item 7 - New Business**

a. Resolution for 2020 CLG Memorial Hall Nomination

Resolution No. 01-2019 is for the submittal of an application with the Missouri State Historic Preservation Office for the FY 2020 Historic Preservation Fund Grant to Nominate Memorial Hall to the National Register of Historic Places.

Mr. Walters stated that this is a requirement for application for CLG and before Council. This is for the 2020 Memorial Hall National Register nomination. Mr. Bruckner asked the question why is it \$10,000.00? Ms. Sullivan stated we hire a consultant. Mr. Ramsour wanted to know if anyone has discussed this with Connect2Culture? Several people stated that Mr. Wert has contacted them just to see if things were still moving along. Ms. Frankoski stated that everything was fine with Connect2Culture no problems or issues.

b. 2019 Missouri Historic Preservation Survey & Reports

Mr. Ramsour thanked everyone for their diligence.


